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Dear all,

A warm welcome to our Christmas newsletter. This has been a very busy end of a very good term! Our new Year 7s have really established themselves and made a brilliant transition to their secondary schooling. Thankfully our new English block and Diner extension were ready for the start of term and what a difference they have made to the quality of what we offer. The challenge now is to bring the rest of the school up to that same standard and I hope that the New Year will bring with it some much needed funding opportunities from central government to do just that!

With the physical changes to the buildings, and formal status as a 4-16 through school, we are now consulting on our Admissions Policy. These changes are aimed at supporting the improvements we've made in our primary phase (https://www.halifaxcourier.co.uk/education/find-out-howyour-child-s-school-performed-in-latest-league-tables-1-10155231) and honouring the commitments we made in the original consultation to become a through school. We are also

making some slight changes to the secondary admissions to ensure that, despite our growth, we can keep the family ethos that underpins life at Calder from Reception to Year 11. For many, the end of term brings different opportunities to showcase their talents and we've seen our very own 'High School Musical', Key Stage 3 Calder Edge graduation, Presentation Evening and our Christmas nativity by Calder Primary. It is these milestones that punctuate the school calendar and remind us of the joy that school can bring (though for Year 11, they have just finished their GCSE mock exams in time for the Christmas holidays).

Without the care, courage and commitment of staff across the Trust, these extra opportunities simply wouldn't happen and I would like to mention one member of staff in particular. When I joined the school in 2013, Miss Laura Hutt was Head of Expressive Arts ensuring that the school's commitment to the arts was reflected across the school. Laura was promoted to the role of Assistant Headteacher and has been relentless in helping to raise standards and secure the improvements that have secured our position as one of the highest performing secondary schools in Calderdale and in the top quartile of schools nationally. Sadly, Laura is leaving Calder to take up a new role in an academy in Leeds. I am very proud to have worked alongside Laura and to have played a role in her progression to Vice Principal. I will miss her professionalism, honesty and integrity but mostly her friendship and support and I will ensure that the work that Laura put in to make the Arts such a foundation of life at Calder, continues to flourish.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you, as ever, for your continued support and wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a peaceful New Year.



In November students wore their Pudsey wear and crazy hair to fundraise for Children in Need. The school council also held a cake sale. In total we raised £125.45 for a great cause.





Year 9 and 10 Duke of Edinburgh Award News

This year all Year 9 students have had the opportunity to begin working on their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. Paul Bateman, the Northern Officer in charge of the D of E Trust, helped to launch the program in assembly last year.

On the first Learning for Life Day in October, each form group was logged onto the DofE website with the idea that students would have one designated day in a computer room, once a fortnight, to help them post what they had been doing for each of the three sections – skills, volunteering and physical.

Overall since October, students have been posting what they have been doing on a regular basis. The next challenge will be working out a way of delivering the necessary expedition skills to the whole year group. With the help of Year 9 tutors I am sure that we can help the students to prepare for summer expeditions.

The current Year 10 cohort of 14 students meets on Monday evenings to look at expedition preparation such as navigation, equipment needs, First Aid and camp craft. These students will be trained up ready to go out on expedition in May. Other Year 10 students who wish to join this group must get up to date with their sections. I am available any day except Wednesday, in IB1 to help if necessary.

GCSE History Department Berlin Trip



29 History GCSE students and 3 members of staff departed for Berlin on Thursday 24th October for four days of soaking up German History and culture. After departing in the early hours, we arrived in Berlin at lunchtime a little tired but ready for a half-day walking tour which gave us a feel for the city as well as showing us some of the major sights from the city's past. The students particularly enjoyed the eccentric nature of our guide and his unique ways of stopping traffic!

Friday morning was another early start ready for a visit to the Olympic stadium, built by the Nazi party for the 1936 Olympics, followed by a trip up the Reichstag dome and a guided tour of the Topography of Terror, the site of the SS headquarters in Berlin. We even managed to fit in time to sample the Currywurst and mastered the use of Berlin's public transport network! After a quick stop at the hotel for our evening meal we headed out again for an evening of ten-pin bowling.





On Saturday morning we were met by a coach to take us to Sachsenhausen concentration camp in Oranienburg. We spent our time with a guide who showed us the site and told us the stories of people who had been imprisoned here during the Nazi regime. On Saturday afternoon headed to a shopping mall back in Berlin to do some gift shopping and to grab a late lunch. Then, it was time to go back and pack. In the evening students participated in a quiz and some team building games to end our trip as Sunday morning we were heading for the airport.

We had a fantastic time and the students were a credit to our school with a number of members of the public, including two airline staff, on separate occasions commenting on how polite and well-behaved our students were.

Cool running! Calderdale Cross Country Championships

Twenty keen athletes from Calder High took part in the Calderdale Cross Country Championships at Savile Park on November 20th. There were four races in which students participated - the Year 7 Girls race, Year 7 Boys, Year 8 and 9 Girls combined and Year 8 and 9 Boys combined.

Overall students ran well but needed to finish in the top 12 to secure a place in the Calderdale Team for the next phase of the competition which would be the West Yorkshire Championships in Leeds in February 2020.

In the Year 7 Girls race, Fearn Hanson had a great run finishing 8th. In the Year 7 Boys race, Wynn Standish narrowly missed qualification finishing 17th while Thomas McKee had a marvellous run to finish 4th and Ollie Pickens also qualified in 12th place.

In the combined Year 8 and 9 Girls race, Savanna McLaughlin finished 12th and Nona Love in year 8 finished just ahead in 11th position both qualifying for the West Yorkshire Championships.

Probably the best race of the afternoon was the Year 8 and 9 Boys combined race. In this event four of our runners qualified; Jacob Ferguson was 12th, Tom Owen was 5th, George McFie was 3rd and Charlie Pickens, after a really hard fought battle with a student from Crossley Heath, won the race. In this race Calder High School were also Calderdale Champions with a lower combined score than any other school.

November 2019 saw the students of Calder High School perform, *High School Musical* Jr. which transported the audience to the fictional school of East Side High!






